Abstract (updated 12/2008):

The objective of this proposal is to build the capacity to examine the individual, social and environmental factors that influence perceptions of sexual health and sexually transmitted infections (STIs) in northern frontier populations. We propose to take a modified communitybased participatory research approach to investigate sexual health, focusing on Alaska, northern Canada, and Greenland. Our aims are: Aim 1: Describe sexual health and the basic epidemiology of STIs in northern frontier populations We will describe and compare the burden of reported STIs in Alaska, northern Canada and Greenland by basic demographic characteristics including age. gender and race/ethnicity. We will incorporate community level factors to look for ecologic level associations with sexual health and STIs. Aim 2: Build capacity for investigating sexual health issues with northern communities. Key informants will be identified within these interested communities and interviewed using semi-structured interviewing techniques. The goal of key informant interviews will be to gain basic insights into sexual health and STIs in the respective communities and learn ways of talking about sexual health and STIs that will be culturally sensitive and respectful. Knowledge gained from aim 1 and conversations with key informants will be used to develop a series of talks that will be presented to the different communities through knowledge translation activities. Researchers will partner with communities to help develop and participate in research projects. Aim 3: Investigate sexual behaviors and STI transmission dynamics in northern communities. Community informants and qualitative data collected in aim 2 will help us develop appropriate survey and focus group discussion questions. A sexual health survey(s) will be developed and administered in northern communities. Focus group discussions will also be facilitated in these communities, using semi-structured questions to gain insights into perceptions on sexual health, behaviors, and STI transmission dynamics. Social, cultural, environmental and individual determinants of sexual health and STI risk will be explored.

Greenland Sexual Health Project Update:

- 1. Capacity Building: Travelled to Greenland, September 2007
 - a. Presented our project idea at the NunaMed meeting in Nuuk, September 2007 and gathered support to conduct the study from local health authorities for several regions in Greenland (Nuuk, Sisimiut, Tasiilaq, Qaqortoq, Upernavik)
 - b. Built relationships with the Office of the Chief Medical Officer, the Hospital, and the Paarisa (health promotion)
 - c. Identified and began consulting with a local Nuuk midwife/information consultant (Ruth Montgomery-Andersen) who has been project manager for the study
- 2. Project Development and Implementation: Travelled to Greenland, June 2008
 - a. Developed, translated and back-translated a sexual health survey.
 - b. Hired three full-time, trilingual, research assistants from Greenland.
 - c. Tested and revised a sexual health survey using cognitive interviewing techniques (June 2008).
 - d. Recruited 150 Nuuk residents between 15 and 65 years of age to participate in Greenland Sexual Health Project (July to October 2008). Participants responded to an interviewer administered sexual health survey and self-collected urine and, for women, vaginal swabs, for STI testing (chlamdyia, gonorrhea, mycoplasm genitalium, bacterial vaginosis, and trichomonas).

Canada update:

- Organized the Canadian side of a joint Alaska-Canada meeting on "Sexually transmitted diseases among Alaska Native and First Nations/Inuit/Métis in Canada: Discovering opportunities for collaboration" in Anchorage, Alaska, April 2008
