Do cold temperatures help cause a cold? The culprits for the common cold most often are *rhinoviruses*, which account for the majority of the 1 billion plus cases in the United States each year. Researchers found a mechanism by which a rhinovirus is able to proliferate more easily in cold versus warm temperatures. <u>Disease Daily</u>

Study urges Nunavut to make healthy food choices June 4, 2013. Many adults in Nunavut eat traditional foods, but junk food is also a big part of the daily diet. A recent study, which surveyed 211 Nunavut adults, found caribou, muktuk and Arctic char are the most widely-consumed traditional foods. But it also found high-energy, sugar-sweetened beverages are widely consumed as well. Nunatsiag Online

<u>Climate change and severe thunderstorms</u> June 4, 2013 Analysis has suggested that changes in the atmosphere will lead to severe thunderstorms. In Finland, most severe weather incidents are related to thunderstorms such as lightning, strong wind gusts, hail and tornadoes. On average one person is killed every second year because of a lightning strike. <u>Science Daily</u>
