Mollusk fossils reveal parasite from climate change January 12, 2015. A paleobiologist has found indications of a greater risk of parasitic infection due to climate change in ancient mollusk fossils. His study of clams from the Holocene Epoch indicates that current sea level rise lead to an upsurge in <u>parasitic flatworms</u>. He cautions that an outbreak in human infections could occur. <u>Science Daily</u>

More die-offs in fish, birds, and marine invertebrates January 12, 2015. There have been more catastrophic animal die-offs over the past 75 years. These mass kills appear to have hit birds, fish and marine invertebrates harder than other species. Ways to improve documentation of such events in the future, including the use of citizen science to record mass mortality events in real time. Science Daily

Why Alaska's Arctic tundra is slowly sinking January 10, 2015. *Ned Rozell -* Tundra is a gathering of hardy shrubs, sedges, grasses, mosses and lichen that live in knee-high communities above soil frozen as hard as concrete.
