Émilie Bouchard has been studying one of the world's most successful parasites commonly found in warm-blooded animals, including humans, called toxoplasma gondii. Whales, Walruses & Sea Ducks Move North- Ice Melt 'Amplifying' Arctic Warming June 9, 2016 Rex Graham - Whales, Walruses and Arctic seabirds are moving north as reduced sea ice and warmer water push their primary prey - bottomdwelling mollusks and invertebrates - farther north toward the North Pole. The year-to-year maximum extent of Arctic ice varies, but the average winter coverage has hit historic lows. <u>Examiner</u>

Smartphone Apps Encourage Local Involvement in Climate Change June 8, 2016 Emily Russell - A handful of apps are making it easier for rural communities to report on climate change in Alaska. With a swipe of a smartphone, locals can submit environmental observations, and there's even an app aimed at preventing further change. <u>KNOM</u>

Iceland Carbon Dioxide Storage Project Locks Away Gas, and Fast June 9, 2016 Henry Fountain - Among the concerns about [carbon] sequestration is that carbon dioxide in gaseous or liquid form that is pumped underground might escape back to the atmosphere. So storage sites would have to be monitored, potentially for decades or centuries. But scientists at Lamont-Doherty Earth Observatory at Columbia University and other institutions have come up with a different way to store CO₂ that might eliminate that problem. <u>New York Times</u>

At Ground Zero of Warming, Greenland Seeks to Unlock Frozen Assets June 13, 2016 Alister Doyle - Low-lying tropical island states from the Maldives to Tuvalu view Greenland's 3,000-metre (10,000 ft) thick ice sheet with foreboding since it contains enough ice to raise world sea levels by 6 meters if it ever all melted, over many centuries. But for the 56,000 inhabitants of Greenland, a giant island a quarter the size of the United States, the melt may be unlocking frozen assets and helping businesses including fishing, farming, mining, shipping and tourism.
