Warm Weather, Trial and Error Lead to Prize-Winning Alaska Fruits and Veggies August 28, 2016 Devin Kelly - At the display at the Alaska State Fair on Saturday, the giant cucumber sat like a bright yellow dinosaur bone. The cucumber, grown by Soldotna farmer Patrick White, weighed 20 pounds. The old state cucumber record, set in 1990, was 8 pounds. In Southcentral, warmer-than-average temperatures extended the growing season by several weeks. Local farmers are trying new methods, like high-tunnel gardening, an open-ended type of greenhouse that helps farmers get an earlier start on growing. Subsistence Hunting in Alaska in an Age of Climate Change August 31, 2016 Gloria Dickie - As Arctic sea ice extent diminishes off the northern coast of Alaska, scientists have questioned what kind of impacts this will have on the marine mammals that call the region home - and the subsistence hunters who depend on them. In a study published Wednesday in Biology Letters, researchers interviewed hunters from 11 coastal villages from the northern Bering Sea to the Beaufort Sea to gain an understanding of the challenges they faced, and their potential for adaptation. Exotic Ticks Appear to Be Establishing Themselves in Alaska August 27, 2016 Ned Rozell - While Alaskans have long endured dense mosquitoes and frigid air, we've always had the absence of venomous snakes and dog ticks. But the latter may be establishing themselves here. Scientists Calculate Methane Loads Bubbling Up from Arctic Lakebeds August 29, 2016 Yereth Rosen - Over the past 60 years, 100 million to 300 million metric tons of methane have streamed up from once-frozen lakebeds in the Arctic, concludes a study by Walter Anthony, who is with UAF's International Arctic Research Center, and her colleagues. Alaska Has Finally Been Mapped as Precisely as Mars September 1, 2016 Joel K. Bourne, Jr. - Exactly one year ago, President Barack Obama became the first sitting president to set foot above the Arctic Circle, visiting the small town of Kotzebue on Alaska's northwest coast. Alaska, like much of the Arctic, is remote, often ice- and fog-bound, and is therefore among the poorest mapped places on the planet. During his visit, the president promised that the government could do better, and the government delivered: The White House, the National Science Foundation, and the National Geospatial Intelligence Agency (NGA) released the most accurate digital elevation maps of Alaska ever created.
